Remember, it is not only important to come to school every day, it is equally important to arrive on time! Punctuality for exams and for the school day is crucial to ensure that your child's day starts smoothly and that students are in the right mindset for learning and achieving.

# ATTENDANCE FACTS

- Above 97% is less than 6 days absence a year.
- 95% is equivalent to missing 10 days.
- 90% is equivalent to missing 19 days, students are missing nearly a whole month of school and will struggle to make progress.
- 85% is 29 days absence a year! This is nearly six weeks of a school year!
- 80% students with this attendance are missing a day for every week of school, that's 38 days absence!

Every school day counts towards your child's future. Did you know that there are a total of 175 non-school days in a year? This gives families the opportunity to spend time together; have days out; go on holiday; and have social time.

'Attend today. Achieve tomorrow.' Getting these important habits established early on will make a difference to a student's life, both academically and in their future chosen workplace. Attendance incentives, rewards and support are provided by the School to help students make every day matter.

Thank you to all families who work hard all year to ensure their child's attendance and punctuality is high.

After two years of Covid bubbles, the summer term has started with a return to all subjects being taught in their specialist rooms. Years 7 and 8 are now able to explore corners of the school they have never been to before, whilst older students are discovering just how many rooms have been refurbished since they were last in them. However, it's not 'back to the old ways'. We have created an organisational structure which is perhaps unique in England; merging the way schools were always set up with some of the opportunities which Covid management forced upon us. Therefore, at St Catherine's College:

- Every year group has its own dedicated outdoor play space.
- Tutor rooms remain located in year group 'schools', strengthening the sense of community and giving easy access to the services and pastoral care of their year group leaders.
- To ease movement around the school, we have created a number of one-way systems. If you are passing the school during the day, you may see the new lollipop-controlled crossing of students from the Bedewell site; the skywalk bridge being reserved for students moving in the opposite direction.
- Most toilet facilities are available to all students, but we have some which are age-restricted for certain year groups only.

At the beginning of term, it was a privilege to welcome students in the hall for a traditional assembly and Worship. Mr Berhane spoke to the students about the changes in school organisation and I spoke about the Easter message. Students learned the grim history of crucifixion before hearing John's account of the resurrection of Jesus. The Worship concluded with a personal challenge about how we control the transition from our hopes to a reality. We look forward to working with students to create a productive and successful summer, most especially for our Year 11s as they approach their GCSEs.

# **BIG FUTURES SHOW**


# Report from Mrs O'Connor

There were no goals from either team in extra time, so it was onto penalty kicks. The girls managed to keep their cool scoring all but one of the kicks with the opposition missing three!


A huge well done to the girls and good luck in the semi-final against Warden Park!



# SCOOTER AND BIKE SAFETY

We have received reports of dangerous situations involving young people on bikes and scooters in the local area. To keep safe when travelling to and from school it is important that students follow the following safety rules.

- Kick-scooters should be ridden on the pavement, footpath or in a cycle lane, and not the road.
- Kick-scooters do not have right of way on the pavement or footpath. Scooter-riders should always be prepared to stop or slow down to give way to pedestrians. Pedestrians always have right of way
- Kick-scooters should be ridden with caution. Riding that causes injury to another person could lead to a prosecution.
- When riding a bike, look out for pedestrians and vehicles.
- Wear a cycle-helmet for your protection.
- Don't listen to music when riding on the road; you need to use all your senses to keep yourself and others safe.
- Follow the rules of the road, eg give way at junctions, use hand signals when turning.
- Look out for potholes, cars leaving driveways, pedestrians walking out between parked vehicles and overtaking vehicles.

# Ukraine Crisis: how East Sussex is helping

We are all acutely aware of the situation in Ukraine and how it is impacting on families, including many across East Sussex.

School staff have, and will continue to, discuss the situation with sensitivity when talking to pupils. This includes those children from Russia who live in the UK and are part of our community here in East Sussex.

School places will be provided for refugees who settle in East Sussex, and we are working with schools to ensure that we meet the needs of all our children as they settle into their new schools. We will use our normal processes to ensure that all children are able to be placed within a reasonable distance of their accommodation.

Many of you have responded with donations, support or by offering to open up your homes to refugees. Thank you to everyone who is doing what they can.

These acts of kindness really help as Ukrainians have often fled with few possessions. Many will be traumatised by the war, and all have been through an ordeal.

Our county already has a proud record of helping people forced to flee wars, but this is the largest challenge we have had to rise to. Please bear with us as we work together to provide the checks, living arrangements, school places, support and welcome that new arrivals will need.

In turn, we know all communities in East Sussex will want to welcome and support refugees as they have done in the past.
