We wanted to write to update you on the current situation, and to thank you for your continued support and prayers for the St Catherine's College community.

Against a changing and challenging background, our community has continued to work together to enable us to begin the school year successfully and ensure the continuation of education for our pupils. This is a collective achievement, and we want to thank you for your part. In spite of the additional challenges and pressures, St Catherine's College feels a great place to be at the moment. The children are happy; the school is purposeful; and the mood is calm. The response of the pupils has been truly incredible.

As you may be aware, the main Covid-19 control measure at St Catherine's College is the division of the site into separate schools, one for each year group. Most lessons are taught within a year group's school, with any movement to specialist rooms being escorted by the teacher. Support staff are an extra duty presence to ensure good order while teachers move at lesson changeovers. Extra cleaning staff have been appointed to help existing colleagues to clean rooms between lessons. Every year group has additional handwashing stations. We encourage pupils to make good use of these, as well as the hand sanitiser in every room. We are especially grateful to pupils for observing the rule to wear face masks in shared internal areas; "when not in class, wear a mask"!

The Covid-19 pandemic is generating a devastating legacy both nationally and internationally. While we are fortunate that the Sussex Coast remains one of the UK areas with the lowest proportion of cases, we are nevertheless determined to maintain St Catherine's College as the safest possible environment. We would like to reassure you that planning is in place to manage the unfortunate situation should we have a positive case in school. We want to assure you that we will inform you immediately upon confirmation of any positive Covid-19 test result. We will take the firmest action and precautions in order to keep our community as safe as possible, in conjunction with Public Health England.

We remain committed to providing our pupils with the much-needed stability of continued education and the support and the companionship of our friendly Christian community. Please do contact us if we can offer any further support to you or your family.

We would like to ask you, at this time, to keep St Catherine's College in your thoughts and prayers as we keep you in ours. As always, we thank you for your continued support.



EQUIPMENT

A request from Mr Pittman:

I am pleased to say that after returning to school following a difficult six months, our students engaged in their lessons and are focussing on their learning. To help reduce the risk of infection and keep our community safe, pupils and staff are wearing masks in corridors; wearing coloured badges that identify which year school zone they are part of; and using their own personal equipment. To that end, we ask that pupils bring the following equipment to school every day:

- Face mask, year school coloured button badge, student diary
- · Black, blue and green pens/biros
- Pencils, colouring pencils, pencil sharpener, rubber
- Ruler, protractor, pair of compasses
- Drywipe white board pen, highlighters
- Glue stick
- Scientific calculator (available to purchase from the Mathematics Department at £6.50)
- Reading book or revisions guide
- English dictionary
- Mandarin/French/Spanish dictionary (This will depend on which language is studied)
- Cycle helmet for bicycle users

Should students be required to use scissors, these will be provided by the class teacher and disinfected after use.

Replacement button badges are available in each of the year school offices (20p) as are masks (disposable for 20p; reusable cotton for £1 or three for £2). Profits from the sale of replacement masks and badges will go to charity.



LITERACY

A report from Ms Preston:

I am really excited to take on my new role as Literacy Coordinator as I fervently believe in the equal right of every child to access all the learning opportunities on offer at St Catherine's.

Above all, the most important skill is reading. I was fortunate that my mother taught me to read when I was 3 years old and I am infinitely grateful to her for the joy which reading has brought me throughout my life, from Janet and John to Jane Eyre and from Shakespeare to The Hunger Games.

As well as the benefits of reading in building vocabulary; improving spelling; learning sentence structure; reading meaning beyond the words; appreciating creativity; developing imagination; improving concentration; enriching cultural understanding; developing empathy and problem solving; it is still so much fun!

Reading ability has a proven effect on the future life chances of a child. Children who read books often at age 10 and more than once a week at age 16, gain higher results at age 16 than those who read less regularly. Higher level reading proficiency improves success across the curriculum, not just in English. Low levels of literacy cost the UK an estimated £81 billion a year in lost earnings and increased welfare spending, impacting on 'the success of the economy as a whole'. Reading actually helps you to get better paid jobs and even be healthier!

But the main reason I am always banging on about reading is that it is just brilliant to lose yourself in a story. Who wouldn't love to go to Hogwarts school or Miss Peregrine's home? Who would not want to find a whole world through the back of a wardrobe or take a tour of Wonka's chocolate factory?

Please encourage your children to read at least twice per week for 45 minutes to an hour, or every day for 20 minutes; or better still, read to them or with them so that you can talk about the story together.

MATHS HOMEWORK

A report from Miss Tinkl:

We know that students make the best progress when they work hard in school and continue their hard work at home. In order to best support students, we have a set minimum mark of 70% to be achieved on all their maths homework tasks, to maintain a high standard of work at both school and at home. If a student does not complete their homework or does not achieve the 70% mark, we offer support through after school maths catch-up sessions. Due to the year group bubbles we can only offer this for each year group once per week. If your child is booked into a maths catch-up session you will be informed of this through the EduLink "No HW detention" notification and you will be informed of the date of the catch-up session.

Please be reassured this is a supportive measure and we are here to help our students to improve on their mathematics.

RECEPTION

Owing to the limited size of our reception, we have had to limit the number of visitors to a maximum of three people. To support this capacity, we are kindly asking that:

- If you need to speak with a member of staff, it will be necessary to make an appointment in advance. Please arrive no earlier than five minutes beforehand.
- While waiting for an appointment or to pick up your child during the day, it may be necessary for us to ask you to wait
 outside / in your car.
- If you are entering the School properly, we will ask you to complete a Covid questionnaire (including track and trace details) and to check your temperature. The questionnaire will be destroyed after 21 days.
- If you need to drop anything at school (eg, a forgotten packed lunch or PE kit), please do so at main reception owing to the closure of the Bedewell entrance.
- Any Year 8-11 student entering school after 9.00am, eg, after a medical appointment, will do so via main reception. It is mandatory for students to wear a face mask as they enter the School to reach their class. Year 7 should ring the doorbell beside the last door on the carpark side of their Bedewell building.

Please accept our apologies for reception being less comfortable during this pandemic. It has been necessary to put the sofas into storage to facilitate social distancing and extra cleaning. However, we hope that the welcome remains warm.



In Windows, click **Start** > **Microsoft Teams**.

On Mac, go to the **Applications** folder and click **Microsoft Teams**.


On mobile, tap the **Teams** icon. Then sign in with your Office 365 username and password. (If you're using Teams free, sign in with that username and password.)





Pick a team and channel



With a person or group... Click **New chat** \square , type the name of the person or group in the **To** field, write your message, and click **Send** \triangleright .

Click **Meet now** under the area where you type a message to start a meeting in a channel. (If you click **Reply**, then **Meet now** the meeting is based on that conversation.) Enter a name for the meeting, then start inviting people.
