Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs is one of the five British values taught in schools, and tolerance featured quite prominently in school last week.

Our worships centered around the International Day of Tolerance, a day to promote the respect and appreciation of the rich variety of the world's cultures. The day was launched by the United Nations in 1996 following the wars in the former Yugoslavia; a series of conflicts that coined the term 'ethnic cleansing' and highlighted intolerance between cultural and religious groups within Europe.

In College Worship, the focus was on the life of Mahatma Ghandi and his non-violent protests in South Africa and India, during the time of the British Empire. Ghandi was successful in helping his country achieve full independence in 1947 but failed to persuade the diverse religious communities to unite and to demonstrate the mutual tolerance that he longed to see. Consequently, partition of the Indian sub-continent and the foundation of West and East Pakistan led to violence; the death of one million people; and the greatest mass migration in human history.

Last week was also Anti-Bullying Week with the theme, 'United Against Bullying'. This year's anti-bullying message was, that we all have a responsibility to prevent and respond to bullying. Researchers have shown that in bullying incidents, people take on a range of identified roles. There is often a Target, a Ringleader, Assistants, Reinforcers and Outsiders. The challenge to all of us is not to be an Outsider but to take on the role of the Defender; to speak up for the Target; and to speak out against bullying. We encourage pupils and parents to report to staff at school any incidents they believe to be bullying.

Our College Worship on tolerance ended with this reflection, 'If we were tolerant of people's differences, would Anti-Bullying Week be a thing of the past?'

GHANDI AND TOLERANCE

In 1915, Ghandi was honoured with the epithet Mahatma or Great Soul in recognition of his spiritual character and his commitment to social justice for the poor and the oppressed.


Ghandi wrote, 'Tolerance is the only thing that will enable persons belonging to different religions to live as good neighbours and friends' but in pre-independence India, some Hindus wanted an India free of Muslims and some Muslims wanted their own Islamic State. When violence broke out between Hindu and Muslim groups, Ghandi went on hunger strike to protest.

Ten million people were on the move at the same time when independence from British rule was achieved. Hindus migrated out of and Muslims moved into the newly established West Pakistan and East Pakistan (later named Bangladesh). Of those that were uprooted, one million died on route.

Many of our pupils will be able to trace their family histories back to these events. Those who identify as British-Asian may have grandparents and great-grandparents from Bangladesh, India or Pakistan who experienced these events first-hand.

The British history of Empire and partition is a shared history, regardless of our culture or religious faith. So, I would encourage all to learn more of these events by watching the eight-Oscar winning movie, 'Ghandi' (1982, PG-rated). The film is just over three hours long but well worth the watch.


YEAR 9 DEBATING SOCIETY
